Bald Eagle
(Haliaeetus leucocephalus)



**Protected at
45 Army installations

Habitat: Tops of large trees near rivers, marshes, or other wetland areas.

Nests are often reused year after year; some may reach 10 feet across and weigh as much as 2 tons (4,000 pounds).

Males measure 3 feet total and have a wingspan up to 6.5 feet; females are larger than males and have a wingspan up to 8 feet.

White head and tail feathers appear after the age of 4.

Listed as endangered on March 11, 1967; downlisted to threatened July 12, 1995.

Delisted on July 9, 2007.
